As I See It

As more and more reports of violence erupt in our country we are all concerned. What is the cause of all of this? Who is to blame? Could anything have been done differently? Could that person or this person still be alive?

At this point in time I offer us all encouragement. The sad truth is this: there has been so much violence that it has become hard to see each case individually. It is too easy for us to assume that all of these acts of violence are exactly the same.

This is particularly true in the cases of officers of the law and people of color. It is easy to fall into the habit of thinking that because one side was innocent in <u>this</u> instance that same side must be innocent in <u>that</u> instance and vice versa.

I urge caution. As we are evaluating the news there is not much that we can individually do to stem the tide of violence, but we owe it to ourselves, the victims (whomever they may be), and to justice itself to evaluate each case objectively.
