### "As the Music Director Sees It" . . .

Hello everyone! Your music director here to give you a message that is very dear to my heart. In times of discontent or confusion, in times of transition, many start to wonder, "Where is the **heart**?" We want to find some answer to our questions and some consistency in our daily lives, and we wonder how it is we will surpass the ever-scary word, "change." I honestly believe "change" is the most frightening word in the English language,



but it is not a well founded fear. We think change devalues what we had before and will always lean towards the worst possible direction. But here is the thing: people are not really afraid of change; they are afraid of **loss**. When things change, we are afraid to lose what made that thing special to us. And this is why we need to find the heart of Bethel in moments of transition. The obvious answer, and a very correct one, is that <u>God is our heart</u>. It seems simple to say, "If we keep God at the center of our decisions and at the forefront of our minds, we can surpass any difficulty!" But how do we put that into practice? How do we find out how to manage change in our lives so that we do not fear loss?

In my personal life, there are a couple things that I do to help during difficult transitions. The first one is that I **pray**, and I want to share with you how I pray and how I have seen God working through prayer. As a younger man, I prayed for God to do things in my life. I prayed for Him to help me secure a job. I prayed for Him to "change that person's heart, because they really need you, Jesus!" And I even prayed for Him to perform miracles, like curing diseases in my family members. But with this kind of prayer, I was often left questioning, which was God's way of answering me. I had forgotten an immensely important part of prayer: my own involvement.

Does God hear us talk to him and ask him for things, selfish or otherwise? Absolutely. However, Jesus came to show us that our relationship with God is not a one-way phone call ordering miracles by the dozen, but is a two-way street. Not only are we supposed to ask of God, but we are supposed to listen and **respond.** When I asked God for a job, I saw no results until I realized he had given me the tools, like writing a good resume and learning from my mentors. When I asked God to change people's hearts, yes, He went to work, but God showed me that I am His hands and feet. I really started to see God move when I decided to do my part by reaching out to the people I was praying for, working with them to repair our relationship.

God sent us the Holy Spirit so we could do the work of Jesus in the world. And when it came to miracles, well I can pray for God to cure disease, but was His answer to me one that I never listened to? It was simple. God had made doctors and scientists and law-makers so that they could work for the betterment of mankind, so my prayers to God are important, yes, but so is my response. Donating to the researchers who help develop cures, volunteering time at hospitals and treatment centers, learning all I can about helping those who need it, and voting for legislation that favors the betterment of health for all.

See, the secret about prayer is that it is a conversation, a back and forth. God wants you to speak, but God also wants you to listen. And when we listen to God, we must act. We are the body of the church, after all. Hands, feet, ears, eyes, mouths, brains, muscles, bones, whatever our role is God can use us to better this world. When we truly pray to God, we sometimes hear His call to **do something** about the situation we are in. Yes, there are times God wants us to let go and let Him work, but I am afraid in this day and age, we are much too likely to "let live and let go" than we are to put our work-boots on and help move God's plan in the world. So, let's err on the side of responding positively to the prayerful conversations we have with, God and get out there and make a difference.

The second thing that helps me find the heart of any difficult transition is, as you may have guessed, music. Music is personal to me, in that I find God through music, and I find God through people sharing music with one another. There is something immensely special about singing with other people. It doesn't matter if the notes are always in tune, if the vowels are always perfect, or if the rhythm is always right; there is something that brings me deeper to God when there is more than one voice singing. When we were children, we engaged whole-heartedly in sing-alongs. We sang our little hearts out. For me, it was Mary Poppins. I sang every note of that movie beginning to end, and through that movie I experienced God in music for the first time. Somewhere along the way, we are either encouraged to continue singing, or someone says something that makes us selfconscious for the rest of our lives. Shame on anyone who makes someone feel inferior for his or her voice! We all have a voice crafted by God to be special, unique and beautiful, and God commands us to sing joyfully to Him. I believe He does this, because He knows just how special singing really is and how good it makes us feel, so He wants us all to experience that joy and that connection. Music is my personal path to God, but music with other people? That really is something transcendental. How beautiful is it that people of all ages, creeds, and cultures all share this one, beautiful art form?

Music is truly universal, and God can be found in any style, of any era, from any country, from now until the end of time. God saved me through music, as he has many others. Music gives a voice to those who cannot express what they feel with words alone. Music stretches out to you and places your hand gently in the hands of the people singing, playing, or listening around you. From the moment God created music and commanded trumpets and cymbals and voices to sing His praises, music has been a holy gift.

Unfortunately, people are usually afraid to share music. I don't just mean stage-fright, but rather that people find music is such a holy connection to God and to their memories that they fear losing that, as well. They fear sharing in the music of anyone but themselves and their own personal culture.

For all of human history, there is writing that proves not much has really changed in this regard. In the 500's, music was being used in churches in the form of Gregorian chant, singing in unison and not varying much in the melody. Then, in the late medieval period, someone decided to introduce harmony, and some people thought it was the work of the devil. Fast-forward to the 1700s, when works by Bach were all the rage. At this point, we had harmony and instruments, and things that no one could have imagined or accepted in the years before. After Bach died, a man named Mozart came along, and people thought Mozart's music was sacrilegious at first. They heard his music and thought it was like a rock concert, too many notes and too exuberant for church. People eventually came around, as we can see today. But, in the 1910's, there were reports that Jazz was devil worship and that the modern trumpet was an instrument to be forgotten to history for trying to replace the cornet. It seems like there is a common theme: Everything that was new or different was automatically labeled as bad, sacrilegious, or devil worship. But look at the influence jazz has on many of us today, and the great influence it has had on Gospel music that has shaped our religion as it moved into this century. Hard to believe that something that brings so many people to Jesus today was once believed to be the work of the devil.

Music changes; it is an unstoppable force, and when it does change, it brings with it the cultures of the people who changed it and melds it with the cultures who made it before. It also crosses the boundaries of country-lines (One day, I will tell you stories of the music and works of God I have experienced on missions to Kenya and to Peru). Music teaches us very important lessons about our lives.

My point here is simple: As music changes, so does culture, so does the world, and so does the church. And with each change, comes new cultures to mix with the old, lifts them up, and connects them with what makes each of us special. As music unifies us across generations and cultures, so to our love of God and love for each other should connect us across the generations and across cultures. Is change easy? No. But is change inevitable? Absolutely. It has been since God made the earth. I can imagine on the day God created animals, the animals said, "Well this is so nice! Let's keep it this way." Then God made people and animals said, "Oh God, why?"

It truly is a never-ending cycle, and we have been given tools by the Most High to conquer our fears and live into an uncertain tomorrow with the certainty that though the world changes, this is not a scary thing, but an exciting one. A future of stagnancy is not a future at all, but a future of change is a future of vibrancy and vitality. Let us respect what brought us here and seek to respond to God through true conversational prayer. Let us also embrace music as not only a gift from God, but also as a message of hope for our future; one that signifies that change can be used to strengthen our world, strengthen our relationships to one another, and move us forward towards a more Christ-like world of love and acceptance. Where is the heart? The heart is God in us. The heart is the Spirit moving and shaking the world. God doesn't stand still, so why should we?



### From the Bethel Session . . .

- We had an informal meeting with Patrick Pettit, Chairman of Committee on Pastoral Transition from Shenandoah Presbytery, on July 7th, to discuss Bethel's current status. This meeting was attended by many session members and four members of the congregation. Bethel is classified as a congregation in transition, our next step will be for the presbytery to appoint a support moderator for future session meetings and a pastor liaison. The moderator will be announced the first week of August and the pastor liaison will be appointed by mid-August.
- Patrick recommended that we hire an interim pastor with hope that pastor would be trained in resolving issues of conflict. This will require us to form a pastor nominating committee. Many of our congregation have experience. We will need everyone's support.
- We had no Session meeting in July but handled needed motions by email votes. At this time the next session meeting is scheduled for the 2nd Tuesday of each month but may change to meet the schedule of the soon to be named moderator.


