Message of the Week . . .

Matthew 11: 1-20

Jesus and John the Baptist After Jesus had finished instructing his twelve disciples, he went on from there to teach and preach in the towns of Galilee. When John, who was in prison, heard about the deeds of the Messiah, he sent his disciples to ask him, "Are you the one who is to come, or should we expect someone else?" Jesus replied, "Go back and report to John what you hear and see: The blind receive sight, the lame walk, those who have leprosy are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the good news is proclaimed to the poor. Blessed is anyone who does not stumble on account of me."

As John's disciples were leaving, Jesus began to speak to the crowd about John: "What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swayed by the wind? If not, what did you go out to see? A man dressed in fine clothes? No, those who wear fine clothes are in kings' palaces. Then what did you go out to see? A prophet? Yes, I tell you, and more than a prophet. This is the one about whom it is written: "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you."

Truly I tell you, among those born of women there has not risen anyone greater than John the Baptist; yet whoever is least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he. From the days of John the Baptist until now, the kingdom of heaven has been subjected to violence, and violent people have been raiding it. For all the Prophets and the Law prophesied until John. And if you are willing to accept it, he is the Elijah who was to come. Whoever has ears, let them hear.

"To what can I compare this generation? They are like children sitting in the marketplaces and calling out to others: "'We played the pipe for you, and you did not dance; we sang a dirge, and you did not mourn.'

For John came neither eating nor drinking, and they say, 'He has a demon.' The Son of Man came eating and drinking, and they say, 'Here is a glutton and a drunkard, a friend of tax collectors and sinners.' But wisdom is proved right by her deeds."

Most of us have been on lockdown now for a very long time. In times of solitude we may be questioning our faith and asking where our help is. The Lord our God has his own timetable and has a purpose behind all of this, so we must not give up. For John even questioned these things while in prison and denied who he was. Confinement can put a lot of doubt and stress in our minds. This passage was extremely hard for me to understand as I discovered it was for many during my study and research. But in my interpretation, it fits this week's message.

Jesus performed a lot of miracles, yet people still doubted him. He ate and drank with all walks of people, sinners, tax collectors, and these were people that weren't well revered, to show that all people are welcome in the kingdom of God if you accept it (the gift of the love of God).

There is always evil at work trying to destroy the kingdom prepared for us. This pandemic is another attempt from the devil to do so, he wants us to turn on one another in disbelief and doubt. I believe there is a hidden message of love bringing us together in ways that will make us stronger in faith and the return of fellowship will be a greater experience for all. Perhaps this will be a great awakening to bring more people to Christ. If my thoughts and prayers are correct and answered, we can't become complacent with the outcome. We will need to continue to grow and be evangelistic to keep the new and old believers. This will require change, just as John preached repentance and Jesus proclaimed love and forgiveness conquers all. Our kingdom awaits us, what more can we ask for that God does not already provide us with.

The song of Jesus is playing, so let us act as children that are happy and dance in the streets with belief and trust in him without any doubt, learn to accept the good and the bad, and remember it's his time schedule we live on. His music is always sweet to the ears, just listen.


Stewardship & Finance News & Notes . . .
